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EXPLANATION OF TERMS USED IN THE COURSE CATALOG



AP/HONORS Policies and Procedures – Parents and students will read and sign the “**West Valley High School AP/Honors Parent and Student Contract**” during a parent-night assembly.

Elective - Courses that are not specifically required. A student may choose to take an elective course because of his/her interest in the subject.

Content Standards (CS) – Is the least rigorous of all course levels, and does not meet grade level standards. These courses will not meet standards required for passing the California High School Exit Exam and require IEP or 504 documentation. They do not count for English credit towards graduation.

Essential Standards (ES) – This level course meets minimum state and district grade level standards and requires IEP or 504 documentation. It is not recommended for college-bound students.

Meets UC/CSU A-G Requirements- Courses designed to prepare students for admission to college in an academic subject area (math, science, social studies, English, foreign language or electives). All courses designated as “Meets UC/CSU A-G Requirements” in this course catalog will meet current University of

When in the classroom setting, employment related subjects are discussed. To keep the class relevant, guest speakers are often invited to class. Weekly assignments are required, but can generally be completed right in class. This class may be repeated for credit, but no more than 20 credits of Work Experience Education will be allowed toward graduation requirements. **Job sites must be within the HUSD boundaries. Students holding jobs outside of school district boundaries will not be eligible to take this class.**

Students may earn high school credit by working at a paid job in the community at least 10 hours/week, totaling a minimum of 180 hours/semester. **The job must be at a regular business, not based in the home, within the boundaries of the Hemet Unified School District, and it must meet the requirements of the California Labor Code regarding the employment of minors (If you have a doubt, contact the instructor).** Students under the age of 18 must have a work permit and students must attend 18 classes of related instruction per semester. The curriculum will be based on “How to Get a Job”, “The Economics of Having a Job”, and “How to Leave Your Job Gracefully”. Twenty credits maximum allowed toward graduation (five credits per semester during a student’s junior and senior years). Students enrolled in Work Experience must be enrolled in five other classes unless approved for early release.

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION

FORMERLY R.O.P.

The C.T.E. program gives students the opportunity to explore a variety of occupations and to gain valuable job training and experience. C.T.E. classes are for Juniors and Seniors who are 16 years of age or older. Location of classes varies; and students are responsible for their own transportation. See your counselor or C.T.E. Instruction includes diagnostics, auto electronics and ignition systems, fuel systems, emissions control, and the use of diagnostic test equipment, troubleshooting, basic shop safety, basic engine repair and tune-up, tire mounting and balancing, lubrication, brakes, and suspension systems. Course includes classroom and lab exercises. This course is a prerequisite for the Automotive 2 course.

YEARS OF AGE AND COMPLETION OF AUTOMOTIVE TECH 1

Students will have the opportunity to enhance the classroom training with on-the-job opportunities in a community work site. This course is a continuation of Automotive Technology 1 and is designed to prepare the student for entry-level positions in the auto service industry. Instruction will include diagnostics, auto electronics and ignition systems, fuel systems, emissions controls, and the use of computerized engine and emission diagnostic test equipment. Hands-on training will include troubleshooting, maintenance, and basic repair. Students must have their own transportation to and from the work site 4 days per week.

This course prepares the student with entry-level skills in the construction and/or cabinetmaking industries. Students will learn how to construct and assemble wood cabinets, as well as how to construct, maintain and repair buildings and other structures. Instruction includes safe operation of hand and power tools, terminology and framing techniques, painting techniques, reading and interpreting designs, face framing, door and drawer construction, fastening procedures, and sanding and finishing techniques. Includes a combination of classroom and hands-on training.

- (Off campus) 1PM-5PM T-F 8:30AM- 5PM SAT.

This 1600 hour course prepares students for the California State Board examination and for employment in a variety of beauty-oriented businesses. Training includes hairdressing, haircutting, hair coloring, permanent waving, skin care, and manicuring. This is an intensive program with strict requirements for serious students. Enrollee must have completed 10th grade to start this course. The days and times of the classes may vary depending on the location of the class. Attendance is mandatory on all scheduled days. A deposit may be required on materials and equipment; student may be required to purchase uniform. Student must be 17 years of age to take the State Board of Cosmetology exam.

This class will teach students to provide immediate care to an ill or injured person and train them to assist emergency medical services (EMS) providers. Instructional content area skills include the history of health care, EMS overview, CPR and first aid skills, patient assessment, legal and ethical issues, triage and emergency responsibilities.

The student will also learn secretarial tasks such as typing letters and filing. This course is one semester in length.

Training programs may be directed to meet students' individual needs and interests, depending upon community training sites available. Training sites may include department stores, food and drug stores, specialty stores and on-campus student stores.

Virtual Enterprise is a simulated business that is set up and run by students to prepare them for working in a real business environment. With the guidance of a teacher (“consultant”) and a real-world business partner, the students determine the nature of their business, its products of services, its management and structure, and engage in the daily operations of running a business. Emphasis is placed on using current business software, communications, and the Internet for business transactions.

COMPUTER KEYBOARDING 1A

 - ELECTIVE CREDIT
 - PREREQUISITE: **NONE**
- 5 CREDITS PER SEMESTER
 - GRADE LEVEL: 9 – 12



The goal of computer keyboarding is to develop entry level keyboarding and word processing skills that can be used for either personal use and/or entry level jobs. Students will learn how to type using all their fingers and to do so without looking down at their hands.. Time is spent developing speed and accuracy. In addition, students will learn how to use Microsoft Word to format reports, personal business letters, create columns and tables, and to insert clip art, word art, and watermarks. This is a great class for those who want to be able to type their reports more quickly and to be better prepared for more advanced computer classes, college, and employment opportunities.

HTML is available for students interested in programming. Computer Applications may be taken a total of 6 semesters (1A/B, 2A/B, 3A/B). This class starts by teaching students the basic concepts of word processing using Microsoft Word and then progresses into a more in-depth training of the advanced features of the program. Word processing skills developed in this class will enable students to type school assignments more quickly and could also be used for entry level employment that requires a good working knowledge of Microsoft Word. Note: Good keyboarding skills are necessary for successful completion of this course.

FOODS AND NUTRITION 2(B)

- ELECTIVE CREDIT
- PREREQUISITE: **FOODS AND NUTRITION 1A**
- 5 CREDITS PER SEMESTER
- GRADE LEVEL: 11 - 12

This class is a continuance of the concepts begun in Foods and Nutrition 1. Students will study nutrition in relation to menu planning and meal preparation. Students will plan and prepare formal and informal meals. Regional and foreign cookery will also be studied.

Foods 3 will emphasize baking, pastry techniques and desserts. This will also be the capstone to the Foods and Nutrition Program. Students will learn the fine points of baking layered, cakes tortes, pies and pastries with delicate genoese, butter creams, mousses, rolled cakes, puff pastries, tart shells, and sweet yeast breads.

Foods 4 will be the capstone of the Culinary Program at West Valley High School. The course will equip the student with the skills to become a personal chef. Students will create customer questionnaires, evaluation tools, find and use resources for recipes and research. Students will design menus using descriptive language, artistic design and advertisement. Menu must have dishes that compliment each other and include a main dish or entrée, appetizer, side dish and dessert. The student will prep and prepare a weekly luncheon to be delivered to their assigned client, meeting their personal needs and wishes.



ENGLISH

Graduation Requirements: 40 credits (8 semesters)

College/University Requirements: Most colleges and universities require entrants to take four years of college prep English courses or electives and to earn a grade of “C” or better and pass the High School Exit Exam.

NOTE: Students may be placed in an additional English course depending on results of the California Standardized tests, multiple assessments and/or grades.

Course Levels:

General (meets graduation requirement): are designed for Junior and Senior students who are planning to continue their education at a community college, seek employment or enter a trade school after graduation. These courses focus on practical applications of the language arts and will be useful to students at home, work, and in the community.

College Prep (meets requirement for 4 year college): Prerequisite: “Basic” score (or better) on CST. Freshmen and Sophomores: provides instruction in vital reading, writing and thinking skills that are critical for students’

success in high school and beyond. Juniors and Seniors: targets students who will be going on to two or four year colleges providing them with instruction in interpretative reading, expository writing and analytical thinking.

Honors Classes: (meets requirement for 4 year college): “Proficient” or “Advanced” on CST. Also, students must complete summer work prior to first day of school as a prerequisite. These classes are offered for Freshmen and Sophomores whose reading and writing skills are at or above grade level, who want to pursue a more challenging course of study, and who are motivated to accept a more demanding work load. These classes provide instruction in the skills necessary for success in high school and college as well as providing students with a foundation for Advanced Placement study.

Advanced Placement Classes: (meets requirement for 4 year college): “Proficient” or “Advanced” on CST. Also, students must complete summer work prior to first day of school as a prerequisite. These classes follow the guidelines developed by The College Board Testing Service and prepare juniors to take the Advanced Placement Test in Language and Composition and seniors for the Literature and Composition Test. Students enrolled in the class are required to take the A.P. test and those who receive a passing score will earn college credit.

The Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (NJROTC) is a four-year program integrating Naval Science, Leadership Training, and personal fitness courses. The Navy provides uniforms and dress shoes, at no cost to students, which the cadets are expected to wear one day a week. Naval Science 1 (NS-1) classes study basic Navy organization and teamwork skills. NS-2 cadets focus their studies on world and American history from a naval perspective. NS-3 classes study naval functions and skills, such as sea power and national defense as well as orienteering and wilderness survival skills. NS-4 cadet studies focus on readings related to leadership, class presentations, and unit leadership. Cadets are assigned key responsibilities, within the unit, such as “Commanding Officer,” “Operations Officer,” “Platoon Commander” and “Squad Leader.” At each level and in each class, time is spent weekly in conducting close-order drill, leadership development, and physical education. Several field trips to military installations and civic organizations occur during the program. Students have the option of attending 1, 2, 3 or 4 years of JROTC, and there is NO military obligation associated with these courses, however; after graduation, students successfully completing three or more years of JROTC earn advanced promotion and pay in the military services if they enlist. Students with outstanding grades also compete for full college scholarships and slots at the Naval Academy, the Air Force Academy and West Point.

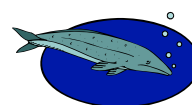

ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSES IN SOCIAL STUDIES

Those who receive satisfactory scores on these exams are eligible for college credit and promotion into higher-level classes upon entering college. Advanced Placement Art History will acquaint students with art and architecture and help them develop an appreciation for the arts. The focus of the course is to develop students ability to analyze the visual and contextual aspects of art and architecture in order to better understand history and culture. Students will engage in college level work and those who pass the AP test will receive college credit

- **ECONOMICS 1A A.P.** #527700A
- SEMESTER CLASS • 5 CREDITS PER SEMESTER
- SOCIAL STUDIES CREDIT • MEETS UC/CSU A-G REQ.
- GRADE LEVEL: 12
- PREREQUISITE: **SENIOR STANDING**

The Advanced Placement Economics course offers students an opportunity to take an AP version of the general, state-mandated course of economics. While both cover state standards, the AP course will prepare students for examination by the College Board for college-level credit in the Spring.

This course is a course primarily in Social Studies, enriching student understanding of the operations and institutions of economic systems, rather than a course in household or business management or budgeting. Throughout this course, measurement concepts and methods should be introduced; for example, tables, charts, graphs, ratios, percentages, and indexed numbers. Behind every graph is an equation or set of equations that specifies a relationship among economic variables. Thus, to master the economic method, students must use graphs and understand, at the appropriate level, the mathematical equations they represent. (HSS Framework, CA Standards)

The A.P. program in European history is designed to develop an understanding of modern European history, an awareness of Europe's changing position in the world, and an ability to analyze historical evidence.

- SEMESTER CLASS • 5 CREDITS PER SEMESTER
- SOCIAL STUDIES CREDIT • MEETS UC/CSU A-G REQ.
- GRADE LEVEL: 12

This one-semester course will give students an analytical perspective on government and politics in the United States. This course includes both the study of general concepts used to interpret U.S. politics and the analysis of specific examples. It also requires familiarity with the various institutions, groups, beliefs, and ideas that constitute U.S. politics. Students should become acquainted with the variety of theoretical perspectives and explanations for various behaviors and outcomes.

Students will examine the relationship between government authority and individual rights, the positions of the two major political parties, and the responsibilities and duties of being a citizen. In addition, they will study the interactions of the three branches of the federal government, the impact and debate over important Supreme Court cases, and current events.

The A.P. class in U.S. History 1 will provide the student with a learning experience equivalent to most college introductory American history courses. The course will emphasize political history, foreign affairs, economic and social development, and literary/cultural history. This class requires advanced writing skills.

The purpose of the World History 1 A.P. course is to develop greater understanding of the evolution of global processes and contacts, in interaction with different types of human societies. This understanding is advanced through a combination of selective factual knowledge and appropriate analytical skills. The course highlights the nature of changes in international frameworks and their causes and consequences, as well as comparisons among major societies. Focused primarily on the past thousand years of the global experience, the course builds on an understanding of cultural, institutional, and technological precedents that, along with geography, set the stage prior to 1000 A.D.

In addition, students develop the ability to criticize their own work, how to work individually as well as to work effectively as a member of a team. Students develop a respect and appreciation for learning that transfers to the students' total academic program.

This course satisfies the State of California classroom requirements for eligibility to obtain a learner's permit/provisional driver's license. The class focuses on the knowledge of the rules of the road and the development of safe driving attitudes and procedures. After successful completion of this course, students must enroll in a private Driver Training course (behind-the-wheel) to complete requirements for obtaining a learner's permit.

TESTS / SURVEYS:

ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) is a test written and sponsored by the military. It measures your skills and abilities in seven (7) different areas and relates them to available jobs in the military and civilian world. The ASVAB is offered twice per year at Hemet High School.

COMPUTER PROGRAMS:

EUREKA is a computerized career information system for California. It provides complete details on more than 500 jobs now available in California. Eureka also includes complete information on schools, colleges, and financial aid programs.

High School Graduation Requirements

Hemet Unified School District Governing Board Policy #BP6146.1(a)

High school graduation shall be contingent upon the satisfactory completion of the required number of units, the specified course requirements or standards and the prescribed course of study. Graduation shall be recognized by the granting of a diploma by the Governing Board upon the recommendation of the school principal. The principal shall recommend for graduation from high school only those persons who have met the requirements as stated by the State Board of Education and the Governing Board of

the Hemet Unified School District. No student shall participate in the graduation ceremony if he/she has not satisfied the graduation requirements. (Education Code 51215-51218)

Units of Credit Required for Graduation

The district requires a student to successfully complete 230 credits in grades 9-12 for graduation and with an exception of the alternative high school an overall grade point average of 2.0.

Required Courses to be Taken/Passed for Graduation

To obtain a diploma of graduation from high school, students, shall complete at least the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year unless otherwise specified.

1. ENGLISH – A student must pass 40 credits of English in grades 9-12 and be enrolled in English every semester.
2. MATHEMATICS – A student must pass 30 credits of mathematics in grades 9-12, including the following specifically required courses.
 - Algebra 1 – If any student completes coursework in grades 7 through 12 that meets or exceeds state academic content standards for algebra, those courses shall apply toward satisfying this mathematics requirement. (Education Code 51224.5)
 - a. Geometry
3. SCIENCE – A student must pass 20 credits of science in grades 9-12. Ten of those credits are in Life Science and 10 credits in Physical Science. Agriculture classes such as Plant and Soil Science and Agriculture Science may be used to meet this requirement.
4. SOCIAL SCIENCE – A student must pass 40 credits of social science in grades 9-12, including the following specifically required courses:
 - a. One semester of Geography
 - b. One semester of Behavioral Health Science
 - c. Two semesters of World History, Culture and Geography
 - d. Two semesters of U.S. History and Geography
 - e. One semester of American Government and Civics
 - f. One semester of Economics
5. VISUAL OR PERFORMING ARTS OR FOREIGN LANGUAGE – A student must pass 10 credits in fine arts or foreign language in grades 9-12.
6. PHYSICAL EDUCATION – A student must pass 20 credits of P.E. in grades 9-12. Every student must enroll in a course in Physical Education in grades 9 and 10 unless exempt pursuant to Education Code 51241.
7. CALIFORNIA HIGH SCHOOL EXIT EXAM (CASHEE)

Students shall take the exit examination in grade 10 and may take the examination during each subsequent administration until each section of the examination has been passed. (Education Code 60851)

A Student in the tenth grade shall be defined as one who has:

- Completed the 9th grade course of student and/or,
- Enrolled in a 10th grade course of study

Students who complete all requirements for a high school diploma and demonstrate mastery of the curriculum in at least six subject matter areas may qualify for an honors diploma. (Education Code 51450, 51451)

The Golden State Seal Merit Diplomas shall be issued to eligible students who demonstrate mastery of mathematics, English language arts, science, United States history and two subject matter areas selected by the student. (Education Code 51450, 51451)

Notifications

At the beginning of each school year or at the time a student transfers into the district, the Board shall provide written notification to all students in grades 9 through 12 and to their parents/guardians that, starting in the 2005-06 school year and each year thereafter, each students completing the 12th grade shall be required to successfully pass the state high school exit examination as a condition of graduation. The notification shall include, at a minimum, the date of the examination, the requirements for passing the examination, and the consequences of not passing the examination. (Education Code 48980, 60850)

TESTS

College entrance also involves taking the SAT Reasoning. University of California campuses require SAT Subject tests as well. Be sure to see your counselor regarding test requirements for the college you

plan to attend. Students should plan to take these tests in the spring of the junior year. SAT's may be repeated in Oct., Nov., and Dec., of the senior year if necessary.

College bound sophomores and juniors should plan to take the PSAT/NMSQT in October and then the SAT in May and June of the junior year.

- ✦ **ALL 9-11 graders will take the state mandated California Standards tests in April/May.**
- ✦ **The California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) is given in November, March and July.**

FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION

A number of grants, scholarships, and loans will be available to our seniors through federal, state, and local agencies. Specific financial aid information will be made available in the Senior Bulletin and numerous student and parent workshops. See your counselor for information and applications.

CONDUCT REQUIREMENTS

Satisfactory citizenship is a requirement up to and including the final graduation ceremony. (NOTE: Some District graduation requirements may be waived or adjusted for transfer students and in certain exceptional cases when recommended by the Guidance Council and approved by the Principal.)
